He found a room full of smoke and a Marine apparently sleeping on a burning mattress. He tried to awaken the man but found that he was unconscious. He immediatly carried him out into the fresh air to revive him. "By his alertness, quick action and presence of mind in an extremely dangerous situation, Lance Corporal Bobikewicz was able to prevent serious injury or death. His actions were a credit to the U.S. Marine Corps."


Staff Sergeant Alvin A. Dashee, logistics chief of the S-4, received a Meritorious Mast for his out-
